

## Parent Resources for 3-Year Old Children

Playing Cards	Suggestions & Tips
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Create a pile of 5 cards and have child point to each card and count up to 5</li> <li>• Have child sort cards by:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Color</li> <li>○ Object (ex: angel fish, sharks, dolphins)</li> <li>○ Numbers (all 2's in a pile, all 3's, etc.)</li> <li>○ Suit: hearts, ♥ diamonds ♦, spades ♠, clubs ♣</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Create two sets of cards and ask child which set has more or less, and ask how they know</li> </ul>

Look at the pictures on each page and have child tell what they think is happening. Read the story to the child.</li> <li>• Have child identify what they see in the pictures</li> </ul>

Handwriting Paper & Crayons	Suggestions & Tips
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Have child draw a picture and ask what they drew. Then write a story to go with the picture (child or parent can do the writing).</li> <li>• Have child draw and write a story (child does the writing)</li> <li>• Have child write their name (parent may want to write it once on the paper as a guide for the child)</li> <li>• Have child draw and write about an activity they have done at home</li> </ul>

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Counters	Suggestions & Tips
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Have child point to each counter and count up to 5</li> <li>• Create two sets of counters and ask child which set has more or less, and ask how they know</li> <li>• Have child create an AB pattern (ex: red, yellow, red, yellow)</li> <li>• Have child sort counters by color</li> <li>• How Many Game: Show a certain number of counters, put a cloth over them, and then add or take some away</li> <li>• Positional word game: Have child place the counters in various positions in relation to another object (ex: put the red counter <u>under</u> the cup, put the green counter <u>in</u> the cup, etc.). Try this with other objects and various places around the house. Add other language including shapes and sizes of objects.</li> </ul>

Items Around the Home	Suggestions & Tips
	<p>Items you have at home will vary but look around and see what you can put to use with your child!</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Provide child with a pile of objects and have child do the following:             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Place objects in a bag and have child try to feel and guess what is in the bag. Have child describe what they are feeling.</li> <li>○ Sort objects by color, naming each color</li> <li>○ Create an AB pattern (ex: spoon, toy, spoon, toy)</li> <li>○ Point to each object and count up to 5</li> <li>○ Identify which room in your home each object belongs in (kitchen, bathroom, bedroom, etc.)</li> </ul> </li> <li>• On a tray or a table, have child make letters, numbers, and their name using Q-tip or finger, shaving cream, sand, snow, or playdough</li> <li>• Gather print objects (menus, brochures, magazines, recipes, food boxes, etc) and do the following:             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Tell child what the object is for, how they are read, and how they are used</li> <li>○ Encourage child to use object in their play</li> <li>○ Show a menu, recipe, or food box and ask child to tell about their favorite food</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Play I Spy: Play using colors, shapes, beginning and ending sounds in words, rhyming (ex: I spy with my little eye—something that is brown, I spy with my little eye—something that has four legs, I spy with my little eye—something that barks.
